

# Do you know you can complain about a tribunal member if you are unhappy about how they have behaved?

We can carefully look into claims about a member's personal conduct. Examples of poor behaviour include:

- The use of inappropriate language.
- Being unpleasant, rude or nasty.
- Falling asleep during a hearing.

We cannot look at the decision made by the tribunal or how this has affected you. This would need to be done through a formal legal process, for example by requesting a review of a decision of the tribunal or appealing a decision. You may wish to take legal advice if you are thinking about asking for a review or appealing a decision of the tribunal.

#### When you should tell us?

You should tell us as soon as possible after you experience any behaviour that concerns you. You do not need to wait until your case is finished to complain.

If you make a complaint after 3 months, you must give us reasons as to why it has taken that time to inform us.



# What you should tell us?

- Your name.
- An address we can use to contact you this can be an email address.
- The name of the person you wish to complain about.
- What you think they did wrong.
- When and where it happened.



It's important that you give us as much information as possible.

#### Information for Children (Aged 12-15 years)

#### What we will do:

#### **First**

- We will reply to you and let you know that we have received your complaint within 1 week.
- We may ask you for some more information if we need it.
- We will explain what the next steps are.



#### Second

- We will look at your complaint and if we cannot consider what you have said, we will tell you why.
- If we can consider your complaint we will tell you that we have passed it to a judge, who will tell us what they think.
- If the judge thinks the matter needs to be looked into more closely, we will let you know. You may be contacted by a judge to answer some questions.
- We will then send you a clear explanation of the result of your complaint.



#### Third

• If you are not happy with the way your complaint has been handled you can contact a Reviewer to look into how your complaint was handled. Further details are below.
